2020 HEAT Awareness Week Campaign May 25-29, 2020



The upcoming weeks are going to HOT, so it's timely that this week is 2020 HEAT Awareness Week!

The summer heat is ramping up and with it comes triple-digit temperatures that last through September. The high temperatures increase the risk for heat-related illnesses like heat exhaustion and heat stroke. In 2019, Arizona hospitals had 2,944 emergency department visits for heat-related cases. Even though heat-related deaths are preventable, more than 250 deaths have occurred annually in the past 3 years in our state.

The Arizona Department of Health Services and the National Weather Service

Offices in Arizona want to help raise awareness about the detrimental impacts of HEAT. Check out the HEAT Awareness Week <u>Campaign Website</u> available in both <u>English</u> and <u>Spanish</u>. Partners are encouraged to post and share content on social media using the hashtags (#AZHeat and #AZwx) to promote the campaign. Messages will help remind family, friends, and visitors about ways to stay safe in the heat while following <u>COVID-19 guidelines</u>.

During the 5-day campaign, messages will be disseminated on heat safety using the acronym (H.E.A.T.) that you can repost. Message examples can be found on the <u>Campaign Website</u>.
